

# **Mathematics & Numeracy**



On June 30th and July 1st we hosted local engineering company and bridge building specialists, Cass Hayward, for STEM workshops with our fantastic year 7s. Groups were able to watch a presentation about bridge construction from Cass Hayward after which they had the opportunity to have a go at launching their own model bridge! They even to costed their solution, adapted to find the most economical option and present their final proposal. The event was an enormous success, drawing on Chepstow school's links with bridges and the local area to provide a relevant, Welsh and rich context for practical mathematics, science, technology and engineering learning. The children produced some amazing results and Cass Hayward had this to say about them:

"The children were polite, engaged and interested in the task - they worked well together in their teams and it was fantastic to see how they approached problem solving without any input from ourselves, some of the children came up with innovative, economical and occasionally cheeky solutions to produce a winning result. It was also good to see them hesitant to give up their cash tokens for assistance from us, they wanted to solve the problems themselves... They came up with a few solutions that none of us thought of. Great out of the box thinking!"

"I was thoroughly impressed by how quickly the students understood the task and fully engaged with the challenge. Their enthusiasm and determination to solve the problem were evident throughout. The fact that every team successfully launched a bridge within the allotted time is a true testament to their creativity and ingenuity!"



# **Mathematics & Numeracy**



We are thrilled to share the fantastic achievements of our Year 7 and Year 8 students in this year's UKMT Junior Mathematical Challenge! This prestigious national competition, run by the UK Mathematics Trust, encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems.

Our students rose to the challenge with enthusiasm and determination, and their results have made us incredibly proud. Across both year groups, we saw a remarkable number of Bronze, Silver, and Gold certificates awarded — a true testament to the hard work and talent of our young mathematicians.

#### Highlights include:

A record number of Gold and Silver certificates awarded this year! Several students qualified for the Junior Kangaroo follow-on round, placing them among the top performers nationally.

Outstanding participation and effort from every student who took part.

We are especially proud of the way our students approached the challenge — not only with skill, but with curiosity and a positive mindset. Their success reflects the strength of our maths teaching and the supportive learning environment we strive to create every day.

Here are some quotes from the report from EAS:

The Cymdeithas Cymraeg are very proactive and enthusiastic leaders. They are an asset to the school. They conduct learning walks, run the Eisteddfod and continue to play a key role in celebrations such as Dydd Miwsig Cymru and Diwrnod shwmae. #### **Race to the Line**

On June 19th Chepstow School became the fastest place around as we had our Race to the Line school finals. 38 teams had spent two weeks learning the science around racing car design and then putting it to use in designing and building CO2 propelled cars. Parents, carers and our Sponsors Cass Hayward joined the pupils in racing the cars across the Arts Hall to see who had the fastest car around. The winning team with a time of 0.97s was Turbo (the snail). Worthy runners up were Mars Bars and Grolly Izis.





The event kicked off with an afternoon tea for the parents and sponsors provided by Mrs Heath and Mrs Jones. They were then escorted over to the Arts Hall to watch the main event.



# Science & Technology

Each car was propelled by a CO2 cylinder along a wire track across the Hall. Each car was timed and the winners were those with the shortest time. This event was made possible through the generosity of our sponsors Cass Hayward LLP who enabled us to purchase the specialist equipment and resources. There were a range of car designs on display from the very aerodynamic but minimalist to some that were themed and colourful but one constant feature was how quickly they went across the hall.

In addition to the racing element, we also looked at the design features and Richard and David from Cass Hayward inspected each car to reach a decision about the three most impressive designs based around appearance and innovation.



Following on from the school final, our winning teams were back in action on the Monday as they took part in the area final. We welcomed the Learning Partnership team of Maia and Aldon and our competition from Somervale School. Our teams swung into action as they designed built and raced a new car all in one day. This was a hugely successful event and resulted in team Turbo celebrating another success. They showed great engineering skills as they refined their design from the school final to cross the line as the fastest car on the day.

#### News sheet Summer 2025

We've had another incredibly busy and inquisitive term across the science department, with students consistently working hard to develop and progress in their new topics!

#### Year 7 Science: The Need for Speed with Bloodhound!

Our Year 7 students have been revving their engines in science this term, working in groups to design their own race cars! They've delved into the fascinating science behind the forces that act upon a car, exploring the principles of streamlining shapes and how to conduct a fair test. We are immensely proud of the tremendous effort our Year 7 pupils have poured into designing and building their impressive models.

#### Year 8 Science: Exploring Our Local Ecology

Year 8 pupils have been out and about, learning all about Ecology this term! They've enjoyed engaging learning walks to observe local nature and have been busy carrying out sampling techniques, using quadrats on our school fields. Their studies have also included understanding food chains and webs, how animals adapt to their environments, and the different types of competition between species.

#### Year 9 Science: Diving into Rates of Reaction

Our Year 9 pupils have kicked off their first GCSE topic with a bang: Rates of Reaction! They've been busy conducting a multitude of experiments, investigating how temperature, surface area, and concentration can affect the rate of reaction.

#### KS4 Science: Hard Work Pays Off for GCSE Exams!

Our KS4 science students have truly exerted themselves this term, dedicating a significant amount of time to revising for their GCSE exams. We are incredibly proud of their exceptional hard work and effort, and we wish them the very best of luck for results day!

# **Expressive Arts**

### Newsletter July 2025

Since our last update in December, the **Art Department** has been buzzing with creativity, exploration, and exciting opportunities for our learners. We're delighted to share what we've been up to.

**Year 7** learners immersed themselves in the vibrant world of Aboriginal Art. Inspired by the traditions and storytelling of Aboriginal cultures, pupils explored the use of natural materials, crafting their own brushes using twigs, leaves, and feathers. They developed their own symbols and applied them to beautiful map paintings, exploring the importance of storytelling through art.

More recently, learners have turned their attention closer to home, focusing on Chepstow's local environment through our 'cynefin' (place and belonging) theme. They have been creating detailed drawings of local buildings and maps, exploring the textures and shapes that make up our unique town.

Earlier in the year, **Year 8** explored the powerful theme of coral bleaching, linking environmental awareness with creative expression. They studied the beautiful and intricate work of artists Yellena James and Courtney Mattison, whose styles blend abstract forms and environmental activism. Inspired by these artists, learners created their own watercolour paintings, experimenting with colour blending, organic shapes, and underwater textures. They also produced clay pieces, building tactile, sculptural forms that reflect the fragile beauty of coral reefs. This project encouraged learners to think critically about climate change while developing important technical skills. More recently, Year 8 have turned their focus to the theme of portraiture. They began by studying the structure of the human face and practised drawing realistic facial features using a range of pencil tones and shading techniques. They then applied these skills to produce detailed self-portraits, showcasing both technical precision and personal expression.

**Year 9** pupils chose a personal or cultural icon to celebrate through art. Learners brought their ideas to life by creating sculptural pieces using wire and mod roc. These expressive and often humorous figures showcased not only technical skill but a thoughtful celebration of the people who inspire them. They explored the work of Alberto Giacometti, a modern sculptor known for his elongated, expressive human figures. Studying his unique style helped learners think about movement, posture, and proportion in their own sculptures, encouraging them to develop character and emotion through their wire armatures before building them up with plaster. Pupils took inspiration from the decorative and symbolic style of Day of the Dead artwork. They studied the use of bold colours, patterns, skull motifs, and floral symbolism, reflecting the joy and reverence found in this Mexican tradition.

We have been truly impressed by the effort, imagination, and growing confidence of our KS3 artists. Their paintings, drawings, clay tiles and sculptures have brought real energy and individuality to our department!

Our Year 11, 12 and 13 Exhibition celebrated the incredible work of our Class of 2025. The exhibition showcased a diverse range of themes, styles, and media — from detailed observational drawings to imaginative sculpture, painting, photography and digital work. This exhibition was not just a celebration of technical ability, but also of creativity, independence, and personal expression. We are incredibly proud of every student. Their dedication, effort, and growth as artists have been inspiring to witness.










# Literacy, Languages and Communication

The LLC faculty recently received 40 new thesauri through the kind funding of the PTA. Having been distributed to each classroom, they are now being used by learners to support their vocabulary development.







#### **Year 10 English:**

During English this year, we have covered a myriad of topics and have learnt a range of important literature and language skills. We have had many high points, including our Of Mice and Men exam results and the marks for our poetry NEAs. These results have helped our class to bond over the shared joys and anxieties of receiving results!

During the teaching and the lead up to the Of Mice and Men exam, we built a deep understanding of the novel, and developed knowledge on each character and theme. We learnt how to find and analyse different techniques used, and how to identify the mood of the extract.

We also improved our writing skills- we learnt how to express ourselves using academic register, focusing on improving the maturity of our writing.


We were also taught skills that can be applied across other subjects, such as time management during exam situations, which we were able to utilise in our other summer exams.

After our January exam, we moved on to the poetry section of our coursework. We began by studying each poem individually, in our case A Peasant by RS Thomas and The Fisherman by Christine Evans. We built upon our knowledge and understanding of each poem, and added in our language and technique analysis too. After analysing each poem in detail, we explored links between the two, developing our comparison skills. We then completed our NEA in our classes. Finishing it was a rewarding feeling as our hard work had finally paid off. We then moved onto our Shakespeare NEA. We began by learning about the Elizabethan period, in which the play was set, using our synthesis skills to gather a range of information. This task helped us to better understand the play. We then used our analysis skills once again, adding in ambitious vocabulary and a range of sentence starters to strengthen our essays. To complete the NEA, we were given the theme of 'strength' to guide and structure our essays, providing a clear focus


To finish the year, we have studied some English language content, helping us to prepare for next year when we address the oracy aspect of the course – speeches and group discussions.

### **Overview of Work, by Myles:**

I think this was an interesting topic as it taught me lots of useful skills which I can use in my future poetry and script writing. I like how the writer of Our Day Out, Willy Russell, has created a variety of characters that embody different feelings and emotions throughout the play. This can be explicitly shown through the differing characters of Mrs Key and Mr Briggs who are two very contrasting characters. Overall, I have enjoyed English and I am looking forward to Year 9.

### Year 9 English

Year 9 has been a very busy year! We have covered a range of interesting and exciting topics. From Gothic to 'Identity'- everything has been different and engaging. One of the non-fiction topics we learnt about this year was social media. We explored many aspects of this area. For example, one of our lesson titles was "What power does social media have on today's society?" which brought about some contentious and mature discussions. Additionally, we analysed thought-provoking images of people fully absorbed in their phones and considered how addictive it could be. We believe this was very important topic because it made us truly understand what is happening in today's world and the consequences we may face as teenagers.

Another non-fiction topic we explored is the non-fiction story of Aaron Ralston and his book "127 hours: between a rock and a hard place." We studied the tone of survival and suspense in the text by doing a group analysis task. Our group analysed "How does Ralston use description and pace to convey the moment of impact?" After the time with our groups, we fed back to the class. We enjoyed hearing other people's ideas, what they had interpreted and how it differed from our own.

We have had an incredible range of wonderful diverse topics that have included a wide variety of cultures, races and identities. However, one has really stuck out for us, we loved exploring poetry! We read a plethora of very different poems annotating as we went. Afterwards we wrote a piece creative writing based from our knowledge and understanding of the poems. To conclude our work on poetry, all of us wrote poems on the theme 'Lost Voices'. We all spoke very highly of the task and the diversity and inclusion of the whole topic. During this task we developed a range of crucial skills which would not only be critical for our GCSEs but would also be of significant importance for later life.

One of our favourite things to learn about was the Victorian body snatchers, Burke and Hare. Hare ran a boarding house in Edinburgh; it all started when one of the lodgers (Old Donald) died, leaving a debt of £4 (£271 today). To cover the cost, they decided to sell the body. The pair were paid £7 and 10 shillings for the body £508. As they were getting more money from selling bodies, they decided to take it up. They killed 16 people overall. Although gruesome, our class was fascinated by the story behind why the bodies were stolen!

Additionally, 'World Book Day' (back in March) was an important event in the English calendar and this year we wrote a 'Chapter 0' for our favourite books. We very much enjoyed this task because it allowed us to look back on some of our favourite reads. We developed literacy skills- learning how to better engage the reads with powerful opening sentences, looking at famous books, such as 'Harry Potter' and 'Percy Jackson', to get inspiration and, sometimes, know what not to do! Another important aspect of creative writing is the use of all 5 senses which we use to enhance our stories.


### Year 9 English





My grandfather was really strange. Cynical, brusque, obtuse – everything about him used to
send shivers down my spine. His short grey hair was thin and patchy, his yellowish skin
wrinkled and tough as leather, and his eyes: those lifeless sockets that seemed to scrutinise
my soul and be coldly indifferent at the same time. He had Alzheimer's Disease, my mom

And so, he ended up spending most of his youth in Dresden, Germany, taking photographs. He witnessed starving children, who were not children anymore, but dun, deprived walking skeletons; ruins of grand buildings that had seen thousands of arms hailing the National-Socialist Workers' Party; the last of the remaining German soldiers fiercely protecting the way to the capital, yelling final commands, and then falling to the ground with an echoing cacophony of gunshots coming from the approaching allied machine guns.

I can't imagine that came very easily though. One of the things he didn't talk about was the frustration. The frustration of no one being able to understand him. As time went on, my family only spoke English. I think they were all afraid that they were going to lose their Arabic. By the time I was born that had happened. I didn't hear any other language until it happened. When we found out we were flabbergasted. He was such a healthy man. It turned out my Paw Paw had dementia. It was the kind of dementia that was developing fast.

By the end of the year my Paw Paw had forgotten how to speak English. He only spoke Arabic – his mother tongue. Every time he spoke and saw the blank expressions looking back at him, I could see the anger in his face. No one understood! It was almost like he couldn't comprehend why they didn't know what he was saying. I think it brought back memories for my Grandma. Bad memories. It reminded her of a time that was unpleasant. A time of discrimination and judgement.




### **Y12 Transition**




